

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER
Monitoring Requirements Not Met for City of Weir

Our water system violated drinking water standards. Even though this was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During June 1 to September 30, 2013 we did not complete triennial monitoring for lead and copper as required by Kansas Administrative Regulations. Therefore, we cannot be sure of the quality of our drinking water regarding lead and copper at this time.

What should I do?

There is nothing you need to do at this time. The table below is a recent history of our monitoring for lead and copper. It shows how often we are supposed to sample, the date that we last sampled, the date we failed to sample, how many samples we are supposed to take, how many samples we took, when samples should have been taken, and the date on which samples are next scheduled to be taken.

| Contaminant | Required sampling frequency | When all samples should have been taken | Number of samples taken | When samples are next scheduled to be taken |
|-----------------|-----------------------------|---|---------------------------------|---|
| Lead and Copper | 10 samples once triennially | June 1 to September 30, 2010 | 10 acceptable samples submitted | June 1 to September 30, 2013 |
| Lead and Copper | 10 samples triennially | June 1 to September 30, 2013 | 9 acceptable samples submitted | June 1 to September 30, 2014 |

What happened? What is being done?

One of our 10 sample bottles was not returned for the testing. We were not sent another bottle to collect a replacement sample, so we registered a failed test. There was no corrective action taken.
